An Antwerp notarial declaration made voluntarily by Giovan Carlo Affaitati, also known as Johannes Carolus de Affaytadi (Cremona 1500 or 1510—Lier 1555 or Ghistelle 1587) soon after he moved to Antwerp, on behalf of Guido de Crema, citizen of Mantua, and Raphael Brumani, citizen of Cremona. It was drawn up before the Antwerp notary Anthony Amala and three named witnesses and appears to concern De Crema and Brumani's inheritance. Affaitati testified to the content of a document drawn up on 31 December 1545 before the Mantua notary Hieronimus de Zizolis. Affitati came from a merchant banking family in Cremona. He set up in Lisbon but moved to Antwerp in 1545, when the Holy Roman Emperor Charles v made him Baron of Ghistelle. He was active in the spice trade and is said to have been the most important financier of the wars of the Holy Roman Emperor Charles v and King Philip 11 of Spain. Formerly folded to a smaller size, leaving traces of the old folds, but still in very good condition. A primary document recording Charles v's financier in Antwerp, only months after he moved there.

Very rare album with four beautiful hand-coloured aquatint views to Alberti's ethnographic monograph on the Xhosa people ("Kaffers"), of South Africa, together with both the first edition, in Dutch, as the first edition of the French translation of this monograph. Even though the plates are mentioned in the preface of the text volume, they are rarely found together. All the plates are brightly coloured and remarkably fresh and lively, evoking the beauty of the African landscape and the culture of the Xhosa.



Lodewyk Alberti (1768–1812) came to the Netherlands in 1784 as lieutenant in the Dutch army, and left for the Cape in 1802. He successfully kept the peace between Xhosas, Khoisan and European colonists, but conflicts flared up soon after he left in 1806. He describes the situation and climate of Caffria, as well as the appearance and physical strength of the Xhosa, but mainly focuses on their culture. Ad 1: small tear in the text leaf of atlas, but restored, plates fine except for a tiny blemish on the first plate; ad 2: slightly browned, and recased, as noted; ad 3; some sentences marked in pencil the margins and an occasional annotation, plates slightly browned and binding rubbed along the extremities. First edition of the German translation of the 16th book of Amadis de Gaule, a collection of popular chivalric novels, translated from a French adaptation of the original Spanish chivalric romance. Amadis de Gaule was modelled after characters from the King Arthur tradition, especially Lancelot, and also heavily influenced by the legend of Tristan and Iseult. Amadis became an exemplary knight: a good Christian who rescued people and fought monsters. The complete series consisted of 24 books, published at Frankfurt between 1569 and 1595. The first surviving Amadis de Gaule was published in 1508 at Saragossa in 4 volumes, edited and enlarged by Rodrigues de Montalvo, and became immensely popular, though the text probably dates back to the 14th century. The French adaptation of the text by Nicolas Herberay increased the work's popularity throughout Europe and inspired many sequels and similar texts. These works also gave impetus to works like Don Quixote, which mocked the chivalric genre.

First and only edition of a chronicle mainly relating the spiritual conquests of Portuguese, in the lands supposedly once ruled by the mythical Prester John (Abyssinia, Ethiopia, Egypt and Sudan). The book summarizes the entire history of the first contacts with Westerners in these lands, giving a comprehensive bibliography on the last 4 pages. It includes an account of the massacre of the Portuguese and Spaniards by the Muslim Turks in Sudan (chapters 16–17). The work also includes accounts of Spanish missionaries murdered in the Americas, notably the West Indies, Venezuela, Panama and Martinique. With two near contemporary owner's inscriptions on title-page and two library stamps professionally removed from the second leaf. Dampstain through the first 33 pages and a few restorations to the lower margins,; a good copy.

An oil painting on brass, showing Jamestown on the island Saint Helena, with its houses, fortress, governor's residence and Church of St James, and with two ships and a boat in the bay before the city. Although the painting is unsigned and undated, it clearly matches the 4 June 1806 print published by Edward Orme in London, which was engraved by John Heaveside Clarke & J.R. Hamble after George Hutchins Bellasis (1788–1822). The interest in Saint Helena rose enormously when Napoleon was imprisoned there in 1815, so that is the most likely time for someone to have copied the 1806 print.

Bellasis took a commission in the British army at Bombay, where his father was commander of the forces. Illness forced him to leave Bombay for home in 1804, but his condition worsened underway and he had to disembark at Saint Helena on 4 November 1804 and remain there eight months to recover before returning home. Bellasis was an amateur artist and when he recovered sufficiently, presumably in the new year, he made a series of views of the spectacular island almost 2000 kilometres from the nearest land. The print made from Bellasis's view of Jamestown, published on 4 June 1806, only months after he returned to England, is so close to the present painting that one must have copied the other. It seems most likely that the painting is a direct copy of the print.

First edition of a beautifully illustrated work on camellias by the Italian abbot Lorenzo Berlèse (1784–1863), perhaps the greatest authority on the subject during the 19th century. The three volumes include 300 different types of camellias, each illustrated with a brightly coloured engraved plate. Each plate is accompanied by one leaf, with the description of the flower printed on the upper half, and a scientific monograph on camellias printed on the remaining space running through all the text leaves. The flowers were drawn from nature in Berlèse's greenhouses at Paris (where he held more than 800 camellia species and types) by the German artist Johann Jakob Jung (1819–1844?). Jung was among the various painters who were influenced by the great French flower artist Pierre-Joseph Redouté (1759–1840), who was praised for his brilliant and prolific illustrations. The first flower in the first volume, the *Camellia derbiana*, is illustrated with two plates.



Elaborately illustrated album amicorum of Wilhelm Bökel junior, with contributions by eminent scholars and noblemen. Bökel (or Böckelius), born in Stendal (Germany) ca. 1600, was the son of a physician and studied law in Stettin (Szczecin in Poland), Helmstedt, Jena and Leipzig. Most of the contributions date from his time in Leipzig (1621–1624), but the album also includes entries from prominent noblemen from Pomerania and the Baltic region, such as Philip II, Duke of Pomerania, and Jacob Kettler, Duke of Courland and Semigallia.

Most of the contributions are in Latin (with some mottoes in French, German and Greek) and 25 are illustrated with the coat of arms of the contributor in coloured gouaches, highlighted with gold. The 23 engraved portraits, several by or after Lucas and Wolfgang Kilian, show European rulers and clergymen. Also included is a view of Venice in coloured gouaches, highlighted with gold, and another of a woman throwing herself on a sword, perhaps intended as Lucretia.

Loosely inserted is a manuscript index and 4-page manuscript report on the album by Johannes Bodel Nijenhuis, noting that it was sold at auction in Leiden by C.C. van der Hoek on 3 March 1854, as well as a copy of the report by C.W. van der Hoek, dated 30 March 1854. First edition of one of the most richly illustrated accounts of a voyage to Russia, Persia and adjacent countries and territories by the Dutch artist and traveller Cornelis de Bruyn (1652–1726/27). De Bruyn sailed for Archangel in 1701, proceeding to Moscow, where he stayed for over a year. In 1703 he left Moscow, traveling by way of Asia Minor (Turkey) to Persia, where he remained until 1705. After nearly a year in Isfahan, he headed for Persepolis, the ancient Achaemenid palace complex, the ruins of which had his special interest. He spent three months there, carefully drawing the ruins of the palace, the remaining



reliefs and cuneiform inscriptions. His drawings of these ruins are the first reliable pictures of this palace made accessible for Western scholars. Leaving Persia in 1705 he proceeded to India, Ceylon and the East Indies. He returned by much the same route, residing in Persia in 1706 and 1707, visiting, amongst other things, the ruins of Pasaragdes. The plates include large folding views of Moscow and Isfahan (194 × 40.5 cm!), portraits of Samoyeds, as well as many illustrations of local flora and fauna.

Rare eighth(?) edition of the Dutch translation of a work on Biblical travels, written by the German Protestant pastor and theologian Heinrich Bünting (1545–1606), first published in German in 1581 and translated by Matthias Hasaert (1578?–1663). The work proved extremely popular and appeared in almost 80 editions up to the 18th century. "However much a work of the study, this book could be easily taken and read as a travel book. Bünting, although he had never actually visited Palestine, produced an original work by recasting Sacred Scripture into a *Reissbuch*" (Noonan). The work is divided into four parts. The first deals with the travels from the Old Testament, starting with a description and a woodcut plan of Jerusalem. Two other woodcut folding plates show the Temple of Solomon and the route the Jews took from Egypt to the Holy Land. The second part explains the Biblical currencies and units of measurement. The third part resembles the first, but deals with the journeys from the New Testament. The work closes with a short theological treatise on the four Evangelists.

Extremely rare complete set of the first edition of the German translation of Buffon's famous Histoire naturelle. Buffon's work presents "for the first time a complete survey of natural history in popular form" (PMM). The first 2 volumes (I.I-I.2) contain Buffon's theoretical essays, including his essay on the earth: "In his view the earth had been originally part of the sun which was broken off by the impact of a comet. It gradually condensed from its gaseous state, and the forces shaping its continents and mountains are still active" (PMM). 'This view of the universe not in a steady state but evolving was a revolutionary idea at the time, paving the way for Darwin in the following century. In his treatise on humans (volume II.I), Buffon 'studied the human species by the same methods that he applied to animal species, including the psychological, moral, and intellectual life of man. From his exhaustive research for the Histoire naturelle des quadrupèdes, [volumes IV-XV] Buffon came to the conclusion that it was necessary to reintroduce the notion of family. Breaking with the spirit of his time, Buffon attempted to separate science from metaphysical and religious ideas" (DSB). Volumes 11.2-V111.2 deal with quadrupeds, and volumes IX.I-XI.2 are on birds.

First edition of Chappe d'Auteroche's account of his scientific expedition to Siberia, illustrated with dozens of remarkably skilful and evocative illustrations. Abbé Jean Chappe d'Auteroche, a French astronomer, was sent to Siberia to observe the transit of Venus, which was due in June 1761. From St Petersburg Chappe d'Auteroche sledged to Tobolosk, where he spent several months, observing the transit and carrying out a large number of scientific measurements. The first volume details the journey, with descriptions of Siberia's geography, natural history, and the culture of its inhabitants. The plates include maps, portraits of native inhabitants in their respective dress, views of cities and villages and several illustrations of experiments with lightning.

Volume two is the first unabridged French translation of a renowned description of Kamchatka by Stepan Petrovich Krasheninnikov, translated from the original Russian.



Autograph letter by the French lieutenant Jean-Antoine Chapsal (1753–1834), addressed to Urion Laguesse, "sous-inspecteur des forets nationales", concerning the appointment of a forester to oversee his woods. He tells Laguesse that, since a forest ranger is required by law, he can appoint someone he thinks appropriate without consulting Chapsal.

"The management of the forest as it exists in France ... has been carefully studied, and several manuals have been prepared for the foresters of the Empire. ... Clavé's Études sur l'économie forestière ... presents a great number of interesting views on this subject, and well deserves to be translated for the use of the English and American reader, but it is not designed as a practical guide" (Marsh).

First edition of the French translation by Thomas Nardin of an extensive history of the Portuguese empire. The preliminaries include the dedication, note to the reader, a chronological annotated list of the rulers of Portugal. Laudatory poems follow, about the death of King Sebastion and succession of King Philip, and about the present translation and its translator. The main text gives the history chronologically from beginnings to the 1580s, including information about Portuguese relations with the Moors in Africa. An alphabetical table of contents, the imprimateur of the city of Besançon and a list of errata conclude the book. With 1 quire somewhat browned, a corner torn off the last printed leaf, affecting 2 letters of a heading, and a few water stains and marginal restorations, but still in good condition. Binding somewhat soiled. A classic history of Portugal in its first French edition.

Posthumous first edition of nearly all writings of Valerius Cordus (1515–1544), the "amazing young genius" (Hunt) whose premature death robbed him of the fame awarded the other great pioneers of scientific botany. Besides his famous works, also including shorter works on trees, distillation and pharmacology. Conrad Gesner (1516–1565) edited and published most of Cordus's writings for the first time in the present edition, nearly twenty years after his death, advancing knowledge of every aspect of botany, but especially phytography and pomology. Many of the 280 or so woodcuts were executed by David Kandel (1520–1592), one of the greatest botanical woodcut artists of all time. Gesner added some further descriptions, including the first Tulip recorded in Europe, seen in April 1559 at the Augsburg garden of Johann Heinrich Herwan and illustrated here for the first time, with a woodcut. Most botanical reference works describe the present edition without the 1563 supplement present here.

With early owner's name at the foot of the title-page, several long marginal manuscript notes and more short ones, occasional underscoring and one opening clearly showing in the gutter the shadow of a plant that had been pressed between the book's pages. With the first leaf and last few leaves somewhat thumbed and with a small chip at their lower outside corners, a couple small marginal tears, and in the last leaves some mostly marginal water stains, but otherwise in good condition. The binding is dirty and worn, but most of the tooling remains clear. An essential keystone for any botanical collection.

A remarkable volume containing three rare print series on architecture, architectural ornament and garden ornament, all published by the important Augsburg engraver and print publisher Johann Andreas Pfeffel the elder (1674–1748).

Ad I: First and only edition of a very rare ornamental garden pattern book (part 2 is especially rare) by the recently appointed court gardener and inspector of the Salzburg gardens, Franz Anton Danreiter (1695–1760). In 1728 Danreiter was appointed court gardener and inspector to related buildings by the ducal bishop of Salzburg. He translated Dezallier's *La theorie et la pratique du jardinage* into German, helping introduce French garden design to German-speaking countries. His own designs in the present work show more than 100 ornamental and fanciful planting patterns on 42 plates, many including fountains. This was his first and rarest model book with garden plans for parterres. They show that far



from endlessly repeating the strict symmetrical canon of French Baroque garden design, Danreiter developed a never-ending variety of ornamental designs which herald the German rococo.

Ad 2: First edition of Johann David Steingruber's first published architectural book, showing working drawings with plans, elevations and sections of town houses and palaces, mostly with scales. It includes several designs for a garden pavilion in an aristocratic park, lavish town houses for the haute bourgeois, and finally a ducal residence. Each design is shown in as much detail as possible. The grander houses are shown including streets and gardens. The Margrave of Brandenburg-Ansbach appointed Steingruber (1702–1787) court architect in 1734. In the course of his near sixty-year tenure he transformed the townscape of Ansbach following his own designs. He is best remembered for his playful "Architektonisches Alphabet" (1773), a remarkable series of designs in which each building has a ground plan based on a different letter in the alphabet.

Ad 3: Rare 18th century copy of selections from the equally rare *Diverses corniches choisies sur l'anticque*, originally issued in 30 plates ca. 1670 by the ornamentalist and painter George Charmeton (1623–1674). First and only edition of an important, wholly engraved model book for German rococo gardens. "Danreitters Buch gilt als das wichtigste Musterbuch für die deutschen Rokokogärten Es enthielt in geschlossener Form seine gültigen Gestaltungsprinzipien. Selbst in Frankreich gab es nichts Vergleichbares" (Beitmann). Several of the plans are likely based on real gardens, for example the plan of the garden of Schloss Klesheim at the end of the 1720s.

In 1728 Franz Anton Danreiter (1695–1760) was appointed court gardener and inspector to related buildings by the ducal bishop of Salzburg. He translated Dezallier's *La theorie et la pratique du jardinage* into German, helping introduce French garden design to German-speaking countries. Danreiter served five successive bishops in Salzburg. Between 1727 and 1735 he also engraved a number of large-scale views of the city which represent a unique documentation of Salzburg in its 18th century baroque glory.

The title-page with a reinforced horizontal fold and some smudges, and a few leaves with minor thumbing and foxing; the plates in very good condition. Marbled sides of the binding discoloured and with stains near the outer edges, but still firm and good.

Ad I: First and only edition of a work on the cultivation of pine trees by the French forester and former lawyer Louis-Gervais Delamarre (1766–1827). In 1802 he acquired the medieval Chateau d'Harcourt in Normandy, where he started what is now one of the oldest arboreta of France. He decided to restore the forest by conducting experiments and using new silvicultural techniques, cultivating an area of 200 hectares, mostly with pine trees. In this work he describes his methods and problems with cultivating the neglected forest, gives remarks and reflections on his experiments, explains how to preserve a forest, and more. The three hand-coloured plates show ground plans of the area around Chateau d'Harcourt.

Ad 2: Bound before ad 1 is the text of the 1669 ordinance by King Louis XIV concerning the French forests.

Ad 3: First edition of a work on geodesy by Fortuné Durand de Monestrol. It starts with a more general introduction to arithmetic and continues with many examples and "problems" for studying geodesy.



Very rare first edition of a treatise on the beech tree (*Fagus sylvatica*) by the French administrator and forester Étienne-François Dralet (1760–1844). It deals in particular with the beech in France, starting with its physical appearance (leaves, flowers, wood, etc.) and habitat. The second part deals mainly with the economic value of the tree, its wood and its beechnuts. It also includes an introduction to the management of a beech forest, with a chapter on beech forests in the north of France and another on forests in the south or up in the mountains. In 1801 Dralet was appointed as "curator" of the waters and forests of Toulouse, where he tried to restore to the state the forests that had fallen into private hands during the Revolution.

A series of charming views of Vienna and its environs in the middle of Beethoven's thirty-five years there, around the time Wagner was born there, and about eight years after it became the capital of the new Austrian Empire, including views of Baden, Klosterneuburg, Bratislava and other neighbouring sites, all attractively and artistically coloured by a contemporary hand. It shows palaces, castles and ruins, churches, chapels and the Vienna cathedral, gardens and pavilions, city streets and squares, the spa at Baden, Christoph de Bach's Circus Gymnasticus, the lavish Apollo Saal, views along the Danube and more. The famous streets, squares, buildings and interiors appear bustling with fashionable ladies and gentlemen, pedestrians and horse-drawn carriages, and the river full of boats. Four views are signed by the artist, Josef Eisner (1788–1861), and about a third by the engraver, mostly Johann Jaresch (but two by Johann Boehm (ca. 1770–post 1821), probably as engraver). All plates are captioned in French and German, and numbered in the centre.



With early owner's name. Although this book can have 100 plates, there is no evidence that any have been removed and none is numbered higher than 73. The present copy may therefore have been issued before the series was complete. The fact that most plates are still in their first states supports that suggestion. With a small stain affecting a couple letters on the title-page, an occasional lighter spot in some of the plates, and part of 1 letter shaved in one caption, but still in good condition. The binding is slightly worn, but is also still good. Lovely coloured views of Vienna when it was the musical and in many ways the cultural capital of Europe.

Rare true 1709 edition of an extremely popular "Household apothecary", an encyclopaedia of household medicinal recipes, written by Eleonora Maria Rosalia (1647–1704) in Silesia and Moravia, Herzogin of Troppau and Jägerndorf, with an appended cookery book. First published at Vienna in 1695, the Granat-Apffel went through about twenty editions in the next sixty years. Beginning with the 1697 edition (also published in Vienna), it included a cookery book as an appendix, described as compiled by an unnamed "Hoch-adelichen Persohn". While herbal medicine had often been practiced by (lower-class and noble) women over the centuries, the Renaissance increasingly brought them (and male authors of popular medical books as well) into conflict with the academic physicians and botanists who were developing new scientific methods. Noble women had the education, means and the security to publish books of household medicinal recipes. The Granat-Apffel was one of the most successful. Its numerous editions exerted an enormous influence on the art of healing and cooking for nearly two hundred years. With one or a few mostly marginal worm holes running through much of the book, affecting a few words of text only in a few leaves, with occasional slight browning, a small stain or other minor defect and with faint offsetting on a half-dozen leaves, but otherwise in good condition. The binding is slightly worn and has minor damage to the backstrip, but is otherwise good. An important source for the role of women in 17th-century medical practice.



First and only edition of a brief treatise on French forests by J.B.F. Faiseau-Lavanne. It deals with the origins of the forests in France, the pros and cons of deforestation, and compares France's forest management to those of other countries. Faiseau-Lavanne's researches led to some important discoveries about the influence of forests on the fertility of soil and the quality of air. The lithographed map, entitled *Carte forestière de la France...*, shows France with all its departments, together with a table listing the departments' acreage and its forests.

A rare conjuror's "magic book" of uniformed musketeers and cavalry, also known as a flip book or blow book, from the reign of the Holy Roman Emperor Leopold II (1790–1792). Remarkably, even the original printed instructions, in German and French, are preserved. The instructions bear the drop-titles "Unterricht zu diesem Magischen Buch, mit welchem man zehen Veränderungen machen kann" and "Instruction pour ce Livre Magique, avec lequel on peut faire 10 Changemens". The conjuror holds the book by its spine in his left hand so that it faces the audience and flips through it with the thumb and fore-fingers of his right hand. He first does this using the lowest tabs and the book appears to be entirely blank. He then magically changes it (perhaps by blowing on it, tapping it, or saying magic words) and flips through it using the next tab. Now



every page shows a Royal Prussian musketeer. He continues with the next tabs to reveal Imperial Russian musketeers, musketeers of the Holy Roman Empire and finally tents with flags. He then turns the book upside down and flips through in the same way. The book again first appears to be blank, then shows cavalry from Prussia, Russia and the Holy Roman Empire, and then the tents again. The Imperial musketeers have an "L" on their hats for the Holy Roman Emperor Leopold II, who reigned only from 1790 to 1792, and the other uniforms are also consistent with this date. Stafford & Terpak notes that no early English examples are known to survive and mentions no German ones, but notes that several Italian and French examples are known from the second half of the 18th century. In very good condition, with even the spine only slightly rubbed. A remarkably well-preserved conjuror's flip book, with even the separate printed instructions.

Rare first and only edition of the Dutch translation by the prolific Dutch writer Simon de Vries, of the well-known accounts of Frick, Hesse and Schweitzer, three Germans in service of the Dutch East India Company (voc).

The first account is by Christoph Frick (1659–after 1717) and was originally published in in 1692 as *Ost-Indianische Räysen und Krieges-Dienste*. He served the voc as a surgeon from 1680 until 1685. Of primary interest is his account of the war with Bantam in 1682.

The second account is by Elias Hesse (1659– after 1689) and was first published in 1687 as Ost-Indische Reise-Beschreibung. "In addition to descriptions of Sumatra and the mines, Hesse describes Java, Batavia, and the Malabar coast of India. Some of his descriptions were borrowed from other works—especially the material on India—but much of it was, if not new, at least based on his own observations" (Lach & Van Kley). The third account is by Christoph Schweitzer and was first published in 1688 as Journal- und Tagebuch. After a brief stay on Java, he was assigned to Ceylon, where he spent the remainder of his five-year enlistment. "Much can be learned from Schweitzer's journal about the daily life of voc soldiers and the society they created in the Dutch outposts" (Lach & Van Kley).

First Dutch edition of an extremely detailed account of the varieties of oak best suited for shipbuilding and their uses. It covers the identification and choice of the varieties of oak, judging the quality of the cut trees, strength, defects, woodworm, diseases, warping and cracking, seasoning, and the uses of the various sorts for interior and exterior shipbuilding. The fact that both author and translator were practicing shipbuilders adds to the book's authority as a primary source on shipbuilding and its terminology.

Funch (1791–1856), assistant master shipbuilder to the Royal dockyards at Copenhagen, published his monumental treatise on ship-

building, *Praktisk Skibbyggerie* in 3 volumes in 1833 and 1834. The Dutch were already well supplied with manuals for shipbuilding, but the detailed account of oak wood was unique to Funch's manual, and Jansen therefore chose to translate that part.

A testimonial letter for a Hungarian journeyman gardener during his Wanderjahre, from Johan Georg Geißner, master "lust Gartner" at Schloss Laxenburg, outside Vienna, the principal summer residence of the Holy Roman Emperor, Karl VI. Philipp Ludwig Wenzel, Graf von Sinzendorff (1671–1742), was Imperial Erbschatzmeister, which apparently included responsibility for the gardens. Since 1721 he had also been director of the österreichischen Orientalischen Handelskompanie, so he may have had a hand in acquiring some of the garden's exotic plants.



Very rare print series, possibly the most extensive set to survive, of some of the earliest lithographic views of Heidelberg, Schwetzingen and vicinity, published and nearly all drawn by Louis Charles François de Graimberg-Belleau (1774–1864). Graimberg was a French royalist nobleman who fled the French Revolution to Germany in 1791 and developed a great love for Schloss Heidelberg for its architectural-historical value and as a symbol of noble culture. The present series gives only his name and seems to correspond closely to the series he published about ten years later, so it appears to be his own edition. Most of the views show the Schloss as it was in Graimberg's time, but a few show it before the fire, based on views by Matthaüs Merian and others. The present set has 33 Heidelberg views followed by 15 Schwetzingen views. The present collection includes four views of the mosque built in the years 1779 to 1795 for Karl Theodor, Elector of the Palatine and Bavaria,

situated on his palace grounds in Schwetzingen, a remarkable symbol of religious tolerance in the late 18th and early 19th centuries. With about half the views slightly browned and a tiny marginal chip in the last 2, not approaching the image, but otherwise in very good condition. With a few small tears in the paper covering the boards (mostly at the hinges and the foot of the spine) and somewhat loose in the spine, but the binding is otherwise good. A very rare series of early lithographic views of Heidelberg and vicinity, including the Schwetzingen mosque.

Much enlarged first edition in French of the first illustrated description of the Low Countries, printed by Plantin, written by the Italian nobleman Ludovico Giucciardini (1521–1589). The original Italian edition was published in Antwerp by Sylvius in 1567 and by Plantin in 1581 with nearly three times as many illustrations and the present French edition was again enlarged. A general description of the Low Countries is given, followed by the different provinces and its cities, with maps of some of the major cities of the province. The topography of the various regions and major cities is emphasized, but it also covers all aspects of contemporary life in each area as well, including an extensive treatment of the fine arts, trade and the commercial concerns of each region. Not only was Guicciardini's book a great success, going through dozens of editions in a wide variety of languages; its maps, plans and views were also copied for decades.

Second edition of a scientific treatise on Pliny's *Natural history* by the German physician and philosopher Melchior Guilandinus (ca. 1520–1589). He mainly focuses on the passages of Pliny difficult to interpret uniformly, including many chapters dedicated to medicinal herbs and plants. Of particular interest is the treatise on papyrus and the flora in Egypt, which Guilandinus visited himself.

With the manuscript owner's inscription of the French scholar Étienne (Stephanus) Baluze (1630–1718), librarian of Jean-Baptiste Colbert (1619–1683), on the title-page. He also had his own library, Bibliotheca Baluziana, which contained over 10,000 printed books and hundreds of manuscripts. His library was auctioned on 8 May 1719). She learned painting and drawing from her father, the Augsburg goldsmith Michael Heckel, engraving from Johann Ulrich Kraus, and married the engraver Hieronymus Sperling (1695–1777) in 1725. It is not clear whether she made these drawings shortly before or shortly after her marriage. She is best known for her ca. 1728 miniature portrait of Charles Edward Stuart (Bonnie Prince Charlie), the young pretender to the English throne. She never recovered from the birth of her first child in 1741, dying within a few weeks. Each drawing shows a young German lady wearing a long gown and a cap or bonnet, but one also carries a hat. The four drawings differ in the style of the gowns and other elements. In very good condition. With a few small chips in the paint of the frame. Lovely watercolour costume drawings of four young German ladies, perhaps from a court wedding in the free Imperial city of Augsburg.

Two rare early 16th-century Cologne imprints in a slightly later binding by the Breslau binder "HB", dated 1540. The first work is a popular manual on the rites of the Roman Catholic mass by Johannes Heynlin de Lapide (ca. 1425–1496) and the second work contains sermons by Augustinus of Leonissa (fl. 1435).

The binder, only known by his monogram "HB", is a Breslau binder active from 1525 to 1540, who is known to have made bindings for Johann Hess (1490–1547), protestant reformer of Breslau, and for the humanist and diplomat Heinrich Ribisch, syndic of the city of Breslau and correspondent of Melanchthon. The present binding has two figurative rolls: the first showing the Crucifixion, Instruments of the Passion, and Resurrection of Christ with the HB monogram (167 × 15 mm; could be similar to Haebler roll no. 6, but instead of the Man of Sorrows, it shows the Instruments of the Passion) and the second the four Evangelists with the HB monogram above the head of St. Matthew and the date at the top of the image of St. Marc (175 × 17 mm; Haebler roll no. 2).







First edition of a comprehensive and well-illustrated treatise on theoretical and practical metallurgy, published by Gabriel's brother, M.G. Jars, who had accompanied him on his journey through Belgium, Holland, Norway, Sweden, Germany, England and Scotland. "Ce livre très estimé, offre, non un itinéraire, mais divers mémoires sur les mines des pays visités par l'auteur: elles sont décrites avec beaucoup d'exactitude; Jars donne leur histoire, les réglements et la forme de leur administration, le mode de leur exploitation ..." (Quérard). The plates show accurate layouts and cross-sections of mines, shafts, mining equipment, and some are maps with mining veins indicated.

The lock on the trunk has the maker's stamp of John Bates in Wolverhampton, England, who was active in the 1860s, and the metal handle of the press has the stamp of its manufacturer "R & L" in Paris. ϵ 25 000

An extensive herbarium comprising about 250 pressed and dried botanical specimens, often with a small packet of seeds attached. They were collected by or for Jaubert, mostly in the 1840s and 1850s, many in exotic lands, including Egypt, Abyssinia, China, South America, Cuba and New Caledonia. The dates on the labels range from 1822 to 1868, but most appear to have been collected in the 1840s and 1850s, when Jaubert was publishing his *Illustrationes plantarum orientalium*. Nineteen specimens (in 3 folders) cover the genus Nicotina, the tobacco family. Besides the specimens themselves, the collection includes a collecting tin and a wooden plant press.

Parts of Jaubert's herbarium are preserved at the Muséum National d'Histoire Naturelle in Paris, with some duplicates at the Conservatoire at Jardin Botanique in Geneva. Parts of many specimens have inevitably broken over the years, but most nevertheless survive in good condition. The paper leaves and folders show occasional water stains and a few have had a corner nibbled by mice, but they still remain in good condition. An extensive herbarium, completed around 1868, with about 250 specimens.

Ad 2: First edition (second issue) of an important work on Constantinople. In 1680 Guillaume-Joseph Grelot, an artist-traveller, having spent some time in Constantinople, first published a book of engravings after his drawings, along with extensive commentary and accounts of his adventures. His book immediately went through several editions. Even his English publisher bragged of Grelot's success with Louis: "The King of France was so pleased with these draughts, that he commanded the author to make them publick, and gave him his letters patents, strictly forbidding any to invade his propriety, by copying them after him".

First French edition of Kaempfer's ground-breaking account of Japan. "It is the most thorough and widely quoted source of information on the history and culture of Japan during the closed centuries of the Tokugawa" (Bowers). Engelbert Kaempfer (1651–1716), a German physician serving the Dutch East India Company (voc), arrived at Dejima in 1690. Although his two-year stay at Dejima was severely restricted, broken only by the yearly visits to the Shogun at Edo, Kaempfer managed to gather a vast amount of information about Japan's natural history, geography, culture, religion, government, language, etc., and he even built up a collection of maps, charts, natural history specimens and other objects. The 45 plates include maps, charts, views and illustrations of plants and animals, instruments, interiors and acupuncture.

Best (and first Dutch) edition of the most important account of the Cape of Good Hope and one of the most important works of all time on South Africa, with twice as many copperplates as the first German edition. Much of the material is based on Kolb's own observations in the years 1705 to 1713, but he also compares them with the observations and theories of earlier writers. The zoological plates show numerous mammals, birds, fish and other marine animals and reptiles, and other plates cover topography, agriculture, hunting, buildings, etc. In addition to these subjects, the text provides detailed information on the customs and habits of the Hottentots, a well-documented account of the voc government of the Cape, the earliest list of South African animals and much information about plants. First and only edition of a rare medical recipe book specifically aimed at children and compiled for use at home. As the author states in the introduction, the book aims at providing effective medical recipes which can be produced at low cost. Nevertheless, the author had originally kept the manuscript to himself, as he feared problems with the medicinal authorities. The more established pharmacists were apparently unhappy when inexpensive medicines were prescribed for the poor, as the "rich and miserly" could equally make use of them. Ultimately it was compassion with the poor, who had to let their children die because they could not afford medical care, that led him to publish the book (*5v-*6r). Whereas the main part consists of inexpensive recipes for a wide range of diseases, including swollen tonsils, epilepsy, kidney stones, dysentery, frozen feet and fever, the appendix contains examples of the very expensive recipes for which the book presents an alternative. The recipe for one powder contains no less than 15 ingredients, including unicorn horn, coral, mother of pearl, bezoar, ruby, garnet, sapphire, emerald and gold and silver leaf. "Common and poor persons" could use an alternative based on peonies and violets (*Anhang*, p. 3).




Very rare edition of the well-known German "Lobwasser Psalter", here published in the Netherlands (in the original German) and first published at Leipzig in 1573, including, with its own title-page but clearly published together, a hymnbook and catechism with translations, adaptations and texts by Martin Luther and Johannes Habermann (1516–1590).

It is splendidly bound in contemporary Dutch richly gold-tooled red morocco. The binding uses 4 stamps (86/87, 106, 121 and 128) and I roll (XXXII) found in the stock of the so-called "Double Drawer Handle Bindery", active I697–I742. The roll was later used by the so-called "Art Book Bindery" (III), active I705–I74I and the "Houbraken Group" (III), active I708–I72I. This last used two more stamps that appear on the present binding (9 and 29), so the attribution remains uncertain, but since the two later binderies were not active until seven years after publication and the Drawer Handle Bindery is known for its bindings for the Wetstein firm, that association seems the most likely. This bindery is considered "the most important Amsterdam workshop of the eighteenth century" (Storm van Leeuwen).

Second state of Mercator's influential map of the North Pole, published by Jodocus Hondius. Mercator's map, posthumously published in 1595, was the first separate map of the North Pole, and was based on a small inset map on Mercator's world map of 1569. In 1604 the plates were sold to Hondius, who published the present second state in 1606, which differed slightly from the first state. "All changes occur to the north of Russia; the one island of the four that is lower right now has an incomplete coastline. Nova Zembla is now one island but has an incomplete coast" (Burden). The map incorporates the explorations in search of the North West and North East passages by Martin Frobisher and John Davis, and also includes Willem Barentz's "Behouden huys" on Nova Zembla. California is identified as Spanish territory and El Streto de Anian is clearly shown. The pole itself consists of four islands surrounding a small open sea, with four strongly flowing rivers separating the islands in accordance with a popular myth. The insets in the corners of the map depicts the Faeroe Isles, the Shetland Isles and the mythical island of Friesland. In very good condition.

A large theatre of war wall map of the Rhine valley, richly decorated, crisply printed on silk and beautifully coloured by a contemporary hand. It was produced during the War of the Spanish Succession (1740–1748). At a scale of about 1:405,000, the map covers the Rhine River from the Swiss-German border about 50 kilometres west of its source at Lake Constance (the Bodenzee) to its mouths at the North Sea in South Holland, and includes northwest Switzerland, midwest and southwest Germany, northeast France, Belgium, Luxembourg and the southern part of Netherlands, stopping just south of Amsterdam. It shows political boundaries, the fortifications of the cities, topographic features, woods and sand banks.

It is tempting to think the map might have been coloured by Bartholomaeus Seuter (1678–1754), an Augsburg faience painter, silk dyer, engraver and supposedly also goldsmith, who worked out of his own house and may have been Matthaeus's cousin.

Second, greatly expanded edition of a popular instruction book for the planting and cultivation of flowers and fruit trees and the tending of a greenhouse, especially intended for young people and first published as *De nieuwe Nederlandse bloem-hof*. The text comprises five treatises, devoted to flowers in general, tulips, carnations, trees & tree fruits and orange & lime trees. Each treatise after the first has its own divisional title-page. All is taught in short chapters in clear and succinct instructions. The grafting of tree branches is illustrated with 4 engraved figures, each on a separate plate. The rarer, separately published *Register* lists hundreds of varieties of fruits and seeds, with extensive space left blank so that the reader can add other varieties. The preface notes that the book is especially intended for both amateurs and professionals, but especially for the young who will in the future own and care for flower gardens and orchards. The cultivation of flowers and the laying out of gardens had long been very popular in the Netherlands.

According to the titles the maps were based on several manuscript maps by a skilled "connoisseur".

The highly detailed maps depict the East Indies in the largest sense, with the first map extending from India to most of mainland Southeast Asia, including Burma, Thailand, Laos, Cambodia and Vietnam, and showing part of China. The second shows the east coast of China, South Korea, Japan, the Philippines and the Mariana Islands. The third shows Malaysia and Singapore, Sumatra, the Maldives and Sri Lanka, with 3 inset maps of Cochinchina, part of the Sri Lankan coast, including Negombo, and the Maduran Strait between Java and Madura. The fourth covers the Malay archipelago, including Borneo, Celebes, Java, New Guinea, Mindanao and the Philippines, with three inset maps of Sumbawa, Solor and Sebira, and Bouton and Pangesane.



Rare second(?) edition (published in the same year as the first) of a Latin treatise on the geography of "Germany", interpreted very broadly to include the Netherlands, Austria, Switzerland and some regions in eastern Europe, where "Germans" lived or had lived. The last three pages discuss recent Spanish discoveries in America (suggesting some may have been discovered by the Carthaginians but kept secret), including the island Hispaniola (noting the observation of an eclipse there in 1494, in fact by Columbus) off the continent that Pickheimer says the Spanish call "Sanctae Marthae". He also mentions Mexico, Temistitan (Mexico City) and not far from them the island[!] Yucatan and other newly discovered islands ("à qua etiam non longe remota est insula Iucatan cum aliis nuper repertus").

The title-page is tattered and restored, very slightly affecting the right edge of the border, but otherwise in good condition and nearly untrimmed, preserving most point holes and some deckles. An important early geographic treatise as well as an early Americanum.

It includes a total of 170 large engravings after Schinkel's drawings and ground plans for many important German monumental buildings, manors, churches, monuments etc., including around 10 plates of the Schauspielhaus (Konzerthaus) in Berlin, one of his major projects. "Between about

1800 and 1840 he [Schinkel] produced a large number of architectural drawings, latterly in relation to commissions which he obtained as his fame spread (more than 500 drawings were in existence at his death, many of which are now in the Nationalgalerie in Berlin). Very rare first and only Schrötter edition, with the text in Latin and German on facing pages, of an alphabetical catalogue of about 1500 plants in the botanical garden of Leiden University, with an appendix listing about 300 plants native to Leiden, first prepared by Florens Schuyl and published in Latin by Johan Elzevier in 1668.

Though clearly based on Vorstius's catalogue, which the Elzeviers had published in 1636, Schuyl's catalogue expands the list considerably, including for the first time South African plants. It also includes the date palm and some Far Eastern plants. Urban Schrötter, court gardener at the botanical garden of the Prince Bishops of Eichstätt, apparently saw this edition through the press. The present edition appears to be the only work listing Schrötter as publisher, so he may have been more editor than publisher in the normal sense.

With an erroneous manuscript attribution to Gottschalk on the title-page and date 1697. In very good condition. The binding is somewhat worn but still good. Very rare Latin and German edition of Schuyl's catalogue of plants at the Leiden University botanical garden.

Very rare first Japanese pharmacopoeia: Siebold's gift to his Japanese colleagues

Very rare first and only edition of a small pharmacopoeia by Philipp Franz von Siebold, translated into Japanese by his student Ko Ryosai from Siebold's Dutch dictation, the only pharmacopoeia produced in Japan until 1886. After the title and a brief introduction on the first four pages, it lists 75 drugs and other medicinal preparations, each in a single column with a brief explanation. It also discusses the effects of the use of various medicines and the treatment of various ailments. It includes coffee, which was previously unknown in Japan. It serves as an important primary source for both the introduction of Western medical knowledge into Japan and for Siebold's teaching methods and his relations with his Japanese students. It probably had a small press run, for it was intended primarily for Siebold to present to physicians and others whom he met during his voyage. In very good condition, with only 2 tiny bits of paper stuck to the margins of the last page. The wrapper is slightly rubbed, with parts of the title-label lost, but still in good condition.

Extremely rare first issue of the first edition of an Italian pedagogic manual on the education of princes from their earliest age, by Abbate Raimondo Silvestri, dedicated to the Princes of Parma. It includes quotes by philosophers and scholars on education and gives examples of good and poor leadership, both historical and fictional, including Aeneus, Brutus, Cato, Cleopatra, Euclid, Hannibal, King David, Mithridates, and many members of the Farnese family of Parma. The references are given in a small type in the margins. An extensive index of "noteworthy things" is included at the end and lists virtues, vices and stages of life (childhood, adolescence, eloquence, passion, affection, etc.). A second index lists the "autori citati", including Boethius, Durando, Erasmus, Francesco Guicciardini, Gellius, Ricardo, Torquato Tasso, Ariosto, Vives and many others.



Rare first and only edition of the German translation of the account of the expedition against the Kingdom of Makassar in the years 1666 to 1669, under command of Cornelis Speelman (1628–1684) on behalf of the Dutch East India Company (voc). The work was translated from the original Dutch published at Amsterdam in 1669. Speelman, a Dutch admiral and governor-general of the voc, lead the expedition against the Sultan of Gowa (= Makassar), together with Radjah Palacca, King of the Bougainese, aiming to keep trade with Makassar exclusive to the Dutch. The sultan wanted to open the port to all nationalities and, as a prominent Islamic leader, he opposed the conversion by the Dutch of the Islamic islanders to Calvinism. The sultan was defeated and submitted to voc control with the treaty of Bungaya (18th of November 1668).

Without the engraved map included in some copies. Title-page slightly browned with a faint manuscript note in the upper margin, and a minor stain on the last leaf. Otherwise in good condition, only slightly trimmed, preserving many deckles.

First and only edition in German of a richly illustrated travelogue of a journey around the Eurasian continent, made by the future Russian Czar Nicholas II. The journey was planned as a Grand Tour through Europe and Asia with the opening ceremony of the Trans-Siberian Railway as the final destination. After visiting Austria, Italy and Greece, Nicholas travelled to Egypt and through the Suez Canal to India. Subsequently Nicholas and his entourage visited the Dutch-East Indies, Siam and China. In Japan the future emperor had a fire breathing dragon tattooed on his arm and received a facial scar due to an assassination attempt. After the opening of the railway in Siberia, the travellers boarded the train back to St. Petersburg.

After the return home, Nicholas and his fellow traveller Prince Esper Ukhtomsky began working on an account of their grand tour. After the publication of the Russian edition in 1893–1897, this very popular work was translated into English, French, German and Chinese. In very good condition with the bindings somewhat rubbed at the edges. A richly illustrated account of Asia in the late 19th century and Russia's relations with its neighbours.

First edition of the German translation by Johann Friedrich Wilhelm Herbst of George Vancouver's famous account of his exploration of the northwest coast of America and east coast of Asia. "This voyage became one of the most important made in the interests of geographical knowledge" (Hill). George Vancouver (1757–1798), who had participated in the second and third voyages of James

Cook, was commissioned by the English monarch to continue the exploration of the northwest coast of America. He was made commander of a grand-scale expedition to reclaim Britain's rights resulting from the Nootka Convention, at Nootka Sound, to examine thoroughly the south coast in order to find a possible passage to the Atlantic. Vancouver put an end to the delusion that the subarctic seas in the direction of Greenland could be reached from Nootka Sound or any of the inlets in its vicinity and his description of the Port of San Francisco and the coasts of California in Spanish hands is most interesting. "This work ranks with the voyages of Cook and La Pérouse among the most important of the 18th and 19th centuries" (Cox).



First edition of a brief treatise on the management of the forests in France, by Philibert-Charles-Marie Varenne de Fenille (1730–1794), "a pioneer of French forestry and member of the Royal Society of Agriculture" (Matteson). The present treaty deals with, among other things, "managing" a forest and felling trees for timber without overexploiting the forests, giving comments on how and when to trim and cut the trees. Shown on the engraved plate is a "compas courbe", a rounded pair of calipers used to measure tree trunks. The treatise was presented to the Royal Society of Agriculture on 9 June 1791.

With the owner's inscription of Henri-Amédée Faré (1828–1894), minister of "eaux et forêts" in France, on flyleaf and a partly trimmed manuscript note at the head of the title-page. An extremely detailed journal of a voyage to the Ottoman Empire in the 325 ton brig Macleod and of the writer's adventures ashore in numerous cities there and in the Middle East, averaging about 3 pages per day, but with much more at the most interesting sights. It was written by Saunderson Walker after his return to England, clearly based on a journal kept during the voyage.

After a brief introduction with background information and an account of the preparations, the present journal records his departure on 22 October 1839 and gives a daily log of the voyage and the islands on the way from England to Constantinople, where he arrived on 23 November. He devotes about sixty pages to the city and its surroundings before setting off for Smyrna (Izmir) on the steamer Stambool. After about 45 pages on Smyrna he set off again, visiting Rhodes, Cyprus, Beirut, Palestine, Egypt, then back to Smyrna

and Constantinople for another long stay. After an excursion through the Black Sea to Odessa and back he set off for home, departing on 21 February 1840 and arriving in Falmouth on 19 April. Walker gives very detailed descriptions of sights, events and people, visiting the bazars, the Seraglio, mosques, baths, dances and religious ceremonies. He ventured beyond the usual tourist sights, however. Coming from a shipping family he arranged to view the Ottoman and Egyptian fleets.

The inserted steel engravings are foxed and a few leaves of the manuscript have browned patches, but it is otherwise in very good condition. The binding is worn at the hinges and has some surface cracks in the spine, but is otherwise also very good. A very extensive and remarkably detailed picture of life in the Ottoman Empire in 1839/40.

Revised and expanded third edition of the pharmacopoeia for the Duchy of Wurttemberg. The pharmacopoeia was composed by the ducal physicians Johann Albrecht Gesner (1695–1761) and Johann Wendel Bilfinger (1695–1756) and first appeared in 1741. Earlier, Wurttemberg had used the pharmacopoeia of the city of Augsburg. Traditionally, pharmacopoeias gave nothing more than the official composition of the most frequently prescribed medicines. From the late 16th century onwards, the publications began adding informative sections, combining textbook and formulary. The *Pharmacopoeia Wirtenbergica* was the epitome of this type of pharmacopoeia and was highly valued for its good descriptions. Revisions appeared frequently, with the dispensatory going through six editions between 1741 and 1789, as medical science changed in the second half of the 18th century. The Wurttemberg dispensatory "was the official book of its time most esteemed and used, even beyond the German frontiers... It was one of the most comprehensive pharmacopeias, supplying information about all drugs, new and old." (Kremers & Urdang). With ownership inscriptions.
